Fiona Hermon, is smoothly settling into her role for the Club as Hon Secretary and we are all well pleased with the Club staying strong and relevant in the post Covid days and the uncertainty that produced. Latterly, Fiona has presided over the changes the Committee felt were necessary with regard to our Breed Show. The Committee had decided that post-Covid the prospect of holding the annual Club Show by ourselves was no longer feasible nor sustainable, the Club having made losses, albeit modest ones, even prior to Covid.

The decision was taken after conversations with one of our former Show Managers. Di Taylor, to perhaps share with the Somali Club after they expressed their interest in sharing with us as they also had worries regarding the post-Covid situation, Many Clubs were following the same route of sharing a venue. sometimes multiple Clubs. Brian Gregory, who had been partnered by Di Taylor, had decided to retire as Show Manager after many years of looking after our Annual Show. Originally, his wife Anne Gregory, a prominent GCCF Judge and distinctive figure in the Cat Fancy had partnered him and successfully run the Club's Breed Show for many enjovable vears. Brian's health has not been the best lately and we send all our thanks and best wishes to him.

Di Taylor stepped aside as Show Manager for the new venture as she wished to show her own cats at our first joint venture and fulfilling both roles of Show Manager and exhibitor was not permissible. We thank her sincerely for stepping into the breach and helping out after the sad loss of Anne Gregory, her late friend a few years ago.

The first joint show took place (in February) and proved very successful especially as far as not running at a loss was concerned and how the teams worked extremely well together. The only fly in the ointment came from the fact that the venue sadly is no longer proving to be fit for purpose (being closed down for a long period had done no favours for the venue!) nor was it large enough to accommodate the two Clubs. Unfortunately, some prospective attendees of both Clubs had needed entries to be returned because of the surprisingly larger entry numbers than had been anticipated and the hall had soon reached capacity. This has necessitated the search for a new, affordable venue that will take more cats and exhibitors, and have all the necessary facilities required. Our diligent Show Managers and the Committee are already on the case and have one in their sights. Enquiries are in hand, and plans are being made so those that were disappointed this year please be assured that next year we will accommodate all, with bells on!!

Some of you have expressed your willingness to attend next year at a new venue despite your disappointment and your continued lovalty and support of your Club's Breed Show is much appreciated. Those of you who do not actually show would of course be more than welcome at a good day out and we have the added interest of household pets and lovely Somalis who come within the same category as our beloved Norwegians. We also hope to have first rate catering available so no worries about refreshment! Volunteers to help out on the day are always very welcome too. This is your Club, all are welcome. exhibitors or not. This Committee recognises and acknowledge that former Committees and members put great effort into achieving Show status and we of the present must do all we can to honour the efforts of those gone before us to make our Club what it is today. We were quite disturbed at an unprecedented drop in 2021 but this is appears to have been across the board affecting the GCCF Clubs because the Office of the GCCF directed that we could use numbers from earlier years (pre-Covid) on our Annual Returns. The Committee is making a continued concerted effort to encourage new memberships. We tentatively commenced an idea in 2022 of subsidised membership for the first year for kitten buyers (from our official Breeders only). The idea is that our Breeders promote membership to their kitten buyers at the subsidised rate of £3.50 single, £5 joint/family at the time of purchase. Many of these will fall by the wayside at the year-end but those numbers will assist membership annual figures and then more than likely will be replaced by the following year's kitten purchasers.

We hope to establish a rolling programme. Some may well continue their membership with the Club which would be great as we are here to provide continued support should they require help or advice concerning their growing kitten on its journey to mature cat.

New legislation – compulsory microchipping for cats 21 March 2023

Microchipping is now mandatory for cats

New legislation was introduced in England on 13th March 2023 and all cat owners must have their pets microchipped by June 10, 2024. Owners who don't get their cat microchipped will be given 21 days to have one implanted and if they don't, they could face a fine of up to £500.

This change is part of the Government's flagship Action Plan for Animal Welfare, and campaigners hope it will mean more lost or stray cats can be reunited with their owners.

How do vets insert a microchip in a cat?

Microchipping a cat isn't dissimilar to them receiving their vaccinations. The microchip is inserted via a quick injection between the cat's shoulder blades and they should experience little to no discomfort.

Once in place, the cat won't feel the chip. The actual chip sits inside a special capsule which won't break down and is designed to last for a cat's entire life.

When should I get a kitten microchipped?

There's no minimum age to have a kitten microchipped although it should be done before they go out for the first time. Many owners will do it at the same time as they're having their pet neutered when they're already under general anaesthetic. Most rescue centres will microchip kittens by the time they're eight weeks old. In any case they should be microchipped before they are let outside to explore.

Whether you're buying a kitten or welcoming an older cat into your home, microchipping them should be top of your priority list because it gives you the best chance of being reunited with them if they're lost or stolen. If you're moving house, always remember to change your address and/or phone number on the microchip.

If you move home or change contact details, it's vitally important that you get your cat's microchip updated. Contact the database where your pet is registered to change your contact details. If you know the database your pet is microchipped with, you can check details online or by phone.

If you don't know the database your pet is microchipped with, take them to your local vet or rescue centre. They'll be able to do a scan and give you the number.

I was beginning to question my decision at this point whilst carrying a very heavy kitten, all her supplies and mine too. Luckily her breeder was on hand to help with vetting in, setting up the pen, reading the catalogue and the results board. Antonia took to it whilst I was incredibly nervous.

What if the judges were mean and she hated it? And what was I going to do for three hours!? (I have now learnt breakfast is an important part of a cat show day). Antonia did amazingly well. She came first in her open kitten class for both shows and got best of breed for the Yorkshire Cat Club Show. When we were allowed back in the hall at 1pm she was at the front of her pen. trilling to people walking past. I had nothing to worry about, she was having the best time and because she is such an attention seeker she helped me to talk to other people which I would never have done.

I now go to shows independently. Antonia is Grand Premier Calenevis Ursula and just got best female neuter at the NFCC 2023 show. It is such an honour to know on the day the judges thought she deserved to be up there. But for me I genuinely go to shows for the enjoyment and the connection it gives me to my cats. To me she is my little girl with an abundance of sass and for as long as she enjoys going, we will be there.

It is daunting showing for the first time. Even filling out the application, my second one took me eight hours! I can confirm, no cats are ran in a ring with their servants being dragged in all directions.

There are plenty of crazy cat people armed with brushed and excellent conversation. And puppy pads are not just for puppies and a necessity on car journeys.

Presenting a Norwegian Forest Cat for judging By Nadine Duffin

TO COUNCIL OF

Stewards can assist a judge by presenting the cat in a manner that helps them view the hallmarks of the breed. Norwegians are a large, long strongly built breed that still maintains its elegance. They should have a deep chest and a powerful neck. To show this to the best advantage a Norwegian should be held in a slightly stretched position, with a hand under the chest just behind the cats front legs. The other hand should be placed on the upper part of the rear legs of the cat. Be careful not to put any pressure on the cats bladder, in case the cat has a full bladder as it will be uncomfortable for the cat and cause them to wiggle.

This slightly stretched position shows off the cats coat and the owners grooming. Care should be taken not to crush the cats coat by hugging the cat. This position also allows the judge to easily check the cats tall length which should reach to at least to the shoulders but preferably the neck.

From the front, the judge can see the cats head shape, showing off the equilateral triangular that is one of the hallmark of the breed. The large, oval, obliquely set eyes and the alert aristocratic expression. The judge can use a teaser to get the cats attention and to get them to hold their ears in the correct position where their ears follow the line of the head.'

Though Norwegian Forest Cats do like to have 4 paws on the floor, this is a comfortable safe position for them, ideally exhibitors practice with their kittens into show pose from a young age and rewarding them with a treat or a game with a teaser whilst in this position at home

Even large male cats can be comfortable held in this position as you can use hip to rest your elbow on of the hand holding the front of the cat and your other forearm resting on your other hip.

Care should also be taken not to over stretch larger cats as their back will start to sag causing the washing line look; which can put pressure on the cats spine.

Norwegian Forest Cat Club Show 2023















I would like to start by thanking the show managers, committee and exhibitors for a highly enjoyable day at the recent show. I have judged at this venue previously when it was solely used by the NFCC so had a good idea of the parking, hall layout etc. Stepping into Di and Brian's shoes as show managers, Shelagh and Kit did an amazing job. They are so very experienced and consequently the joint shows ran like clockwork. I would like to thank them personally for the tremendous amount of hard work that they did behind the scenes.

Parking here is excellent, very close to the hall so not too far to carry heavy cats, which is always a bonus. I was particularly impressed at how the two clubs (Norwegian Forest Cat Club and Somali Cat Club) worked so well together, resulting in, amongst other things, a very well run catering section – some lovely looking cakes for sale – and the judges were really well looked after, both before judging and at lunch.

Thank you to everyone who supported the show, either by entering, working or visiting. Post Covid, any breed clubs holding a show have so much to consider, most of all, would people actually support by bringing cats? Everything needed to run a show has increased in price, not least the penning/transport costs to hire the cages and a crystal ball is needed to see whether an event is actually viable and not going to suffer a huge loss. I was very pleased to learn that the event was so well supported that it was full before closing day, thank you everyone for entering!

I think that the clubs had both done a fantastic job on advertising the event and consequently the hall was particularly busy and buzzing during the afternoon with lots of visitors as well as exhibitors present. One small comment regarding this, it was very difficult to manoeuvre the trolley down the aisles in the afternoon as some people had chairs beside their pens, which made things really tight and slowed things down somewhat. At times we had to ditch the trolley, and really, the Norwegian Forest is much happier with all four feet on the table as well as it making it much easier to assess the cat. If a hall is busy and space is tight.



please consider your judges and stewards and make room for them to get the trolley through.

The quality was superb, so many lovely cats to handle. I did not envy Sandra Moore having to choose the Overall Best in Show with so many beautiful cats being in those "top" pens. Any one of them could have won the Overall Exhibit. I judged the Prefix Pairs Class, and wow, what a class that was! Nine pairs of cats entered, sadly one pair not able to be judged since one of the two cats was absent. With sixteen cats to assess as eight pairs, you may wonder how I did it. Well. I assess each cat individually and give it a "Daphne Grade", something I have used for many years, a series of ticks, pluses and minuses. Then I add up the grading for each pair to evaluate both how nice each cat is and how well they do as a pair. This enabled me to place the top three pairs in order. I really do enjoy judging the Prefix Pairs Class.

I had some great classes, my AOC Neuter Class was "a belter" and I think that I needed a lay down in a darkened room after finishing it, so many stunning cats, and on this occasion choosing BOB was really challenging. I went back and forth several times before making my final decision.

The range and quality of stalls was excellent, plenty to choose from, I'm glad that I was occupied judging or I could have come home with an empty purse! I hope that the raffle raised lots of funds for the show.

The 2023 Show was a "baby step" back into holding cat shows for both the NFCC and the Somali and I think that people probably held their breath, keeping fingers crossed and hoping that it would be a success. Well it was a massive success so huge congratulations to all involved! Together the two clubs made a great show, so much so that perhaps the time has come to look at a bigger venue. Of course, looking for a suitable venue is always such a headache for all involved, it's so difficult to find a hall that ticks all the boxes. Over the years I have been involved in evaluating numerous halls for other clubs and there is always something that could be better. I am sure that the committee, aided by the show team, members and exhibitors will come up with ideas to make the show go from strength to strength.

Tail easily reached the shoulders, it was very well furnished and bushy. Well developed coat, especially for a kitten, she has a woolly undercoat and lots of longer water resistant quardhairs which are of good slightly harsh texture. She is a solid black rather than black smoke, however, there are no points for colour so I did not take this into account when judging her. CAT POISON

There's a reason why cats are known for their curiosity and it can sometimes get them into trouble. While they are more careful eaters than dogs, they can be poisoned by licking things off their paws or coat, and common things around the house can be toxic. Here are the top cat poisons to look out for......

Painkillers

The way a cat's body works is very different to humans, so you shouldn't ever give your cat any drugs meant for people. Painkillers are particularly dangerous, especially paracetamol and ibuprofen. Although vets do sometimes prescribe human medicines for cats, the dosage is very complex so don't try it at home.

Mice and rat poison

Rodenticides can be toxic for your cat, either by coming into contact with the poison directly or by eating a mouse that has been poisoned. If you have a pet, it's much safer to find another way to get rid of your unwanted house quests.

Flea or tick products

Spot-ons, flea collars, powders and shampoos are a common cause of poisoning in cats. This is usually down to using a treatment that was meant for dogs, giving them the wrong dose or using two types of treatment together. It's always better to buy your products from a vet but, if you do get a shop-bought product, make sure you follow the directions very carefully.

Lilios

Even a dusting of pollen on a cat's coat is enough to cause a reaction to many types of lily, including Easter, tiger and oriental lilies. Cat owners should avoid having lilies in the house. While most cats tend to ignore plants, kittens and indoor cats are more prone to chewing them so, if you have an indoor cat, you might want to consider avoiding houseplants all together.

Antifreeze

If you use antifreeze make sure your cat is out of the way and store it safely and securely away from prying paws. Don't forget to mop up any pools of spilled antifreeze so your cat won't come into contact with it.

Paint remover

Keep your cat out of the room when you're using products like white spirit and turpentine and, if your cat does get paint on their fur, don't try to take it off yourself – that's a job for the vet!

Slug pellets

If you want to get rid of slugs, it's best to either use a non-toxic form of slug control or cover treated areas with chicken wire so your cat can't get to them.

Coal/tar-based products

This includes things like creosote and disinfectants that turn cloudy when mixed with water. Most diluted cleaning products are fine if the directions on the label are followed properly, but keep them out of the way to be on the safe side and contact your yet if your cat drinks a significant amount.

Onions

Onions contain a substance that can be toxic for cats and, even when it's just used as flavouring in food, it can cause problems. Either way, onion or no onion, giving your cat scraps from the dinner table seems like a nice treat but they might not thank you later when they're suffering from a poorly stomach. If you want to use treats, for example during training, stick to ones made especially for cats and remember that most treats are high in calories and fat.
